GENERAL LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY ELECTIONS OF ANDHRA PRADESH 2014 AND 2019 - A STUDY

ABSTRACT

Andhra state was created in 1953 from the Telugu speaking Northern districts of Madras state. It consists of two distinct cultural regions – Rayalaseema and Coastal Andhra. It hadn't included few telugu speaking areas from Hyderabad state. On November 1,1956 Andhra Pradesh became the first state in India under the States Reorganisation Act,1956 which is formed by merging Andhra state with Telangana region of Hyderabad state. Later by Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act,2014 Telangana state was separated back out of Andhra Pradesh on June 2,2014 creating the new states i.e., Telangana and residuary Andhra Pradesh. The united AP Legislative Assembly have 294 Legislative Assembly seats which were distributed between the AP and Telangana i.e., 175 seats for AP and 119 seats were allocated to State of Telangana.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY ELECTIONS OF AP-2014 AND 2019

The 2014 AP Legislative Assembly Elections were held on April 30,2014 and the results were declared on May 16,2014. The parties that contested in the Assembly elections are INC,CPI,CPI(M),TDP in alliance with BJP and JSP, YSRCP,NP and Independents. The TDP succeeded in securing a majority of 102 out of 175 Legislative Assembly seats and there by formed the government. YSRCP won 67 seats ,BJP secured 04 seats and the Navodyam party and Independent secured 01 seat each where as INC did not secured any seat in the Legislative Assembly elections.

The 2019 AP Legislative Assembly elections were held on April 11,2019 and the results were declared on May 23,2019. The parties that contested in 2019 Legislative

Assembly elections are INC,BJP,TDP,YSRCP and JSP in alliance with CPI,CPI(M),BSP and other Independents.YSRCP swept the polls by winning 151 out of 175 Legislative Assembly seats.YSRCP won all seats in the Kadapa,Kurnool and Vizianagaram Districts.TDP won 23 seats and JSP won 1 seat where as INC and BJP did not secured any seat in the Legislative Assembly Elections.

The below Table-1 clearly shows that the strength of the AP Legislative Assembly- District wise data and also gives clear picture on 2014 and 2019 AP Legislative Assembly Constituencies along with No. of seats secured gained by the different political parties.

In 2014 there are 29 SC constituencies,7 ST constituencies and 139 OC constituencies and in 2019 there are 28 SC constituencies 7 ST constituencies and 140 OC constituencies which shows that there is a decrease in 01 SC Reserved constituency and increase in 01 OC constituency. The only difference in 2014 and 2019 AP Legislative Reserved Assembly Constituencies is from Chittoor district, Satyavedu Legislative Assembly Constituency. The constituency is SC

reserved in 2014 and has no reservation in 2019. The ST Reservation is present mainly in 5 districts of AP i.e., Srikakulam, Vizianagaram, Visakhapatnam, East Godavari and West Godavari. The reservation is mainly based on the presence of ST population.

The below Table-4 clearly narrates the category wise elected Women Representatives in 2014 and 2019 Legislative Assembly Elections in the Ditricts of AP.

In 2014 Legislative Assembly Elections of AP the total number of Women Representatives elected is 3 from SC category,2 from ST category and 9 from OC category and in 2019 Legislative Assembly Elections of AP the total number of Women Representatives elected is 4 from SC category, 4 from ST category and 6 from OC category. When compared to 2014 and 2019 AP Legislaive Assembly Elections it shows that the increase of Women Representatives from SC category by 1, 2 from ST category and decrease of 3 Women candidates from OC category in 2019. The total number of elected Women Representatives in 2014 and 2019 AP Legislative Assembly Elections remain the same i.e., 14.

As per the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendment Acts of Indian Constitution provides 33% Reservation for Women in Local Governments because of which the Women Representation is more in Local Governments when compared to AP Legislative Assembly. Hence, it clearly shows that there is a need to amend the Indian Constitution and implement the Women Reservation in AP Legislative Assembly. So that the no. of Women Representatives will be given chance to take part actuve role in the State politics.

Reasons for the success of YSRCP in 2019 AP Legislative Assembly Elections

- 1. Y.S.Jagan's 3648kms long padayatra across AP.
- 2. People appeared to have responded well to Y.S.Jagan's call to them to give him one chance, having seen TDP rule for many years.
- 3. Election strategy and engineering at the time of polls.
- 4. TDP coming out of NDA and coalition with congress made people believe YSRCP as the better opposition to the then ruling party TDP which encouraged Defections
- 5. Y.S.Rajashekar Reddy image also played a key role in keeping YSRCP as main lead in the race.

- 6. Y.S.Jagan's campaign on corruption and failure in fulfilling the election promises made by the then ruling TDP.
- Enhancement of Old Age Pensions from Rs.1000 to Rs.3000 in its manifesto.
- 8. Diminishing presence of Congress also helped in the success of YSRCP.

Reasons for the failure of TDP in 2019 AP Legislative Assembly Elections

- Ignoring the low level cadre of leaders/party supporters by the TDP.
- Fielding of candidates in the elections by the TDP though they have remark on the contesting candidates
- Pending of installment payment relating to Rythu Runa Mafi Scheme.
- 4. Withdrawl of TDP from the BJP alliance at the center before the elections.
- Non-Cooperation of BJP and indirect support of TRS party to YSRCP.
- 6. Enhancement of pensions and providing Pasupu Kunkuma announced at the last moment of the Election
- Administrative and political corruption by some of the TDP leaders.
- 8. Unemployment-No jobs for educated youth which were promised at the time of previous elections.
- 9. Decent % of TDP votes got split and JSP grabbed those votes.

Suggestions for conducting fair elections

- 1. NOTA should be made relavent.
- 2. Mandatory use of VVPAT's with EVM'S.
- Linking of AADHAAR with Voter Identification Card.
- 4. To find a secured way to vote online so that there may be higher voting percentage.
- 5. Immediately after completion of elections the counting of votes should be as early as possible.
- 6. Stringent audit of electoral expenses and if any violation of expenditure which were not shown in the account they should be punished.

- 7. Educating the voter regarding the casting of vote in the EVM's and VVPAT's.
- 8. Decriminalization of politics.
- Administrative and political corruption should be eliminated to conduct free and fair elections.
- Limiting of Nepotism which hinders the growth of a common man in politics.
- 11. Transparency in each step of the election process, so that the true democracy can be achieved.
