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MONEY 'Motivates' OR 'Inspires'?

There is a need to probe whether money 'motivates' or it 'inspires' just as there is a need to differentiate between these two terms. 'Motivation,' seems to work only for a shorter duration. This is why one needs to *keep* motivating. 'Inspiration,' however, lasts for the whole life. Life, actually, falls short of it. Money is merely a 'motivating' factor (and not an 'inspiring' one). For instance, a monthly salary of \$3000 makes one happy if previously he was earning \$2000. He feels happy about this amount for a few months. After a few months the same amount starts appearing less than \$4000 to him. Only a raise is going to motivate him again (for a short while). It is applicable to any figures which someone might be earning or paying.

What 'inspires' for a lifetime is a vision. It actually sucks in many lives. It is larger than the man himself. Many organizations do not give or build a clear vision and expect the employees to *remain* motivated because they are paid (money). Nothing can be farther from truth. It amounts to working *hard* and not *smart* on the part of those organizations. Ignoring the task of working on a shared vision, those organizations introduce measures and mechanisms which the employees do not savor but they have to abide by because they are paid (money).

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There is no shortage of qualified and educated people in the world. But it is not becoming a better place. The world will become a better place if, among many other things, we also understood what 'motivates' and what 'inspires' and the difference between the two.
